It has been said by many parents, "This is going to hurt me more than it hurts you." What makes disciplining our children a grievous task?

#### **Read It**

So I made up my mind that I would not make another painful visit to you.<sup>2</sup> For if I grieve you, who is left to make me glad but you whom I have grieved? <sup>3</sup> I wrote as I did, so that when I came I would not be distressed by those who should have made me rejoice.
